


- a new school lunch vendor, Revolution Foods

Mr. Anderson visited the Rehoboth Rotary and provided them with information about Sussex Academy and charter schools.




Sussex Academy: Best School in Sussex County

Associates, and former U.S. Senator, Mary Landrieu.




Kudos Bus

Everyone at Sussex Academy gives Kudos to our custodial staff for all of their hard work in keeping our building and grounds in pristine condition.








Start with Hello



Dominican Republic Service Trip

Thirteen Sussex Academy High School students attended the Service Learning in the Dominican Republic Trip during Spring Break 2019. The group traveled with "Education First Tours". This is the second trip of this kind and the fourth EF Tours trip since the inception of the high school. The eight-day itinerary was focused on volunteer work at an Villa Pajón EcoLodge located in the central mountain region of La Vega, Dominican Republic. Service projects were focused on helping build sustainable infrastructure for the community to continue to grow as an EcoTourism destination. Students worked on improving two hiking trails, building and installing 15 bird houses for the endemic 'Golden Swallow', and helped improve school grounds for a local schoolhouse. The group was hosted and lead by José (Papito) Delio Guzmán III and his foundation by the same name. The students were exemplary in their willingness to work, test out their Spanish as well as appreciate nuances of a place very different than home!



The golf team claimed a 13-1 record for the season, won their 2nd Henlopen conference south division title, placed 2nd in the Henlopen Conference Individual golf tournament, and qualified for the State Championship for the 1st time, and are ranked 4th overall in the state. The team's low score this season was 157, 14 strokes lower than last year (last year our best score was 14 strokes lower than the previous year).
